## Advice for Child to Self-Isolate for 14 Days

Dear Parent/Carer,

I write to inform you that one of our Year 10 students has unfortunately tested positive for COVID-19 today.

We have sought guidance from the Department of Education this evening. The Year 10 student has mixed within their bubble to allow successful completion of their GCSE studies. The Department of Education have therefore advised me that all Year 10 students at Scalby School must self-isolate at home for 14 days, starting from 6<sup>th</sup> October.

We have already planned for such an event and our Year 10 students will be able to access our online learning provision from 6<sup>th</sup> October. My hope is that we can have this available for our students by lunchtime on 6<sup>th</sup> October and we will text you to inform when it goes live.

I will write to you again shortly outlining how work will be set, how it can be accessed and how support will be provided.

The guidance from the DfE on such action and next steps is clarified below:

We are asking you to do this to reduce the further spread of COVID 19 to others in the community.

If your child is well at the end of the 14 days period of self-isolation, then they can return to usual activities.

Other members of your household can continue normal activities provided your child does not develop symptoms within the 14-day self-isolation period.

# What to do if your child develops symptoms of COVID 19

If your child develops symptoms of COVID-19, they should remain at home for at least 10 days from the date when their symptoms appeared. Anyone with symptoms will be eligible for testing and this can be arranged via <a href="https://www.nhs.uk/ask-for-a-coronavirus-test">https://www.nhs.uk/ask-for-a-coronavirus-test</a> or by calling 119.

All other household members who remain well must stay at home and not leave the house for 14 days. This includes anyone in your 'Support Bubble'.

The 14-day period starts from the day when the first person in the house became ill.



Household members should not go to work, school or public areas and exercise should be taken within the home. If you require help with buying groceries, other shopping or picking up medication, or walking a dog, you should ask friends or family. Alternatively, you can order your shopping online and medication by phone or online.

Household members staying at home for 14 days will greatly reduce the overall amount of infection the household could pass on to others in the community

If you are able can, move any vulnerable individuals (such as the elderly and those with underlying health conditions) out of your home, to stay with friends or family for the duration of the home isolation period

# Symptoms of COVID 19

The most common symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are recent onset of:

- new continuous cough and/or
- high temperature and/or
- a loss of, or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)

### For most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

If your child does develop symptoms, you can seek advice from NHS 111 at <u>Check if you or your child has</u> <u>coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms</u> or by phoning 111.

### How to stop COVID-19 spreading

There are things you can do to help reduce the risk of you and anyone you live with getting ill with COVID-19

Do

- wash your hands with soap and water often do this for at least 20 seconds
- use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available
- wash your hands as soon as you get home
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze
- put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
